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## **Course Description:**

This globally focused version of the First-Year Seminar course is based on the Center for Strategic and International Studies' research-based projections of what the world will look like in 25 years due to the influence of seven global issues. Those seven are population, resource management, technology, knowledge, economic integration, conflict and governance. Students will analyze the impact of the "7 Revolutions" on their own lives as they transition to college.

#### **Course Goals:**

- (1) Students will be introduced to various global, political, economic, social and behavioral systems and explore their impact on their college experience, career goals and daily lives.
- (2) Students can demonstrate the interconnectedness of the "7 Revolutions" and world events as well as their relevance to local, state and national communities.
- (3) Students will develop a better understanding of self that will facilitate their personal and professional success.
- (4) Students' skills in research, critical thinking and communication will be enhanced.
- (5) Students will become familiar with the United Nations' Millennium Development Goals and the ONE Campaign's efforts to further those goals while considering opportunities to engage as global citizens in those efforts.

## **Policies & Procedures**

#### Instruction

Class sessions will consist of lectures, class discussions, numerous in-class assignments (group work), written assignments to be completed outside of class, video presentations and exams. Additionally, various assignments will be completed online during the class periods when you are working virtually. This is a hybrid course, so half of the work will be completely virtually.

#### Attendance

While attendance is not a component of the assessments for the course, it is mandatory. Here's why: If you are not either in the classroom or online, you cannot participate in class discussions, work on in-class assignments, and contribute to the course in a meaningful way. You cannot communicate with the professor or your classmates if you are not in attendance.

If you must miss class, it is YOUR responsibility to find out what you missed. Please get the name and phone number of someone else in class to provide you with the information on what you missed. Realize as well that your grade may be impacted by losing in-class assignment points or missing the opportunity to turn in a homework assignment or give a presentation.

- It is common courtesy to let your professor know if you are going to be absent from class. Please call my office or e-mail me prior to the beginning of class.
- It is also a courtesy to others to turn off your cell phone and pagers (or place them on vibrate) during class. You should not answer your phone or utilize it during class.

### Make-Up Opportunities/Late Assignments

It is quite important for you to come to class and be on time.

Assignments are due and tests will begin at exactly 11 a.m., the same time the door to the classroom closes. Please be considerate of your professor and classmates if you must walk into class once the door closes. Repeated tardiness is not acceptable.

No opportunities exist to make up the participation section of in-class assignments regardless of the circumstance that necessitated your absence. You are eligible to make up the content section with an excused absence. Written assignments and tests can be made up only with an excused absence. A signed doctor's statement on appropriate letterhead is required for a medical absence to qualify as excused. Appropriate documentation is also required for a family emergency/ death to be considered an excused absence. The professor retains the right to ask for any documentation she deems appropriate to ensure the absence is excused, and she retains the right to create new assignments and tests for those students eligible to make up an assignment or test.

Written assignments turned in late due to an unexcused absence or tardiness **will not be accepted**, resulting in a ZERO. Presentations cannot be made up, so failure to participate in those assignments will result in a ZERO. Deadlines for each assignment are noted on the calendar, appear on the assignment sheet or will be announced in class.

- ➤ Please talk with your professor if you know in advance that you will not be in class during the date of a group assignment or debate.
- ➤ Only e-mail messages from your "students.kennesaw.edu" account or from Vista will be accepted and opened. Please do not assume that you can e-mail an assignment when you do not plan to come to class.

### **Written Assignments**

Every course at KSU should improve your communication skills. To that end, this course will focus on both your oral and written communication skills. While this is not a writing course, basic spelling and grammar errors will cause a reduction in the final grade for a writing assignment. Please remember the following automatic deduction:

▶ 10 points for exclusion of bibliography when required by the assignment.

Please also note that all written assignments <u>must be typed</u>. Specific formatting requirements include double spacing, 12-point serif type (like Times Roman or Garamond), 1" margins on all sides, and left justification. Your name, the date, and the title of the assignment should appear at the top of the page. Please staple all pages if your assignment is more than one page in length.

## **Oral Assignments**

While this is not a public speaking course, it is important to present materials during your group presentation in a professional manner. Please be cognizant of the following standards: *Appearance* 

1. Students should dress in a manner appropriate to the assignment, the audience, and the formality of the event or occasion, recognizing that their appearance may enhance or detract from their credibility as communicators.

#### Presentation Content

- 1. Presentations should have an introduction (providing context and seeking to gain attention), a body (providing main points and supporting detail), and a conclusion (restating major themes).
- 2. Content must be organized in a logical fashion that aids the audience's understanding of the topic.
- 3. Content should avoid racist, sexist or profane language.
- 4. Content must be the student's original words and ideas; otherwise, it must cite the sources of words and ideas from others.

## Presentation Delivery

- 1. Presentations should reflect effort to maximize eye contact and minimize reliance on reading notes.
- 2. Delivery should reflect the speaker's enthusiasm, passion, or concern about the topic. This is projected by speaking loud enough to be heard, and by speaking with animation in the voice, facial expressions and gesturing.
- 3. Visual aids, if used, should be neat, professional, and large enough to be seen.

## **KSU Mandatory Academic Advising Requirement**

KSU has a mandatory academic advising requirement that all first-year students meet with an academic advisor two times during their first year. First-Year students will be required to schedule an appointment and meet with an academic advisor in First-Year Advising or in their major department prior to registering for the second and third semester. The required academic advising meetings will be enforced by placement of the "FY-Advising Required" hold on the student's registration. First-Year students <u>will not be able to register</u> until they have met with an academic advisor. Email reminders with instructions for clearing the registration hold will be sent throughout each semester to the student's KSU email address.
